
Kentucky Natural Disaster Unemployment News

As a result of severe Storms, Straight-line Winds, Flooding, and Tornadoes starting on December 10, 2021, the president has made a Major Disaster Declaration. As of December 12, 2021, individuals in Caldwell, Christian, Fulton, Graves, Hart, Hickman, Hopkins, Logan, Lyon, Marshall, Muhlenberg, Ohio, Taylor, and Warren counties are eligible to apply for Disaster Unemployment Assistance.

Filing Details:

- Deadline to file is Tuesday, January 18, 2022
- Affected individuals should visit the Kentucky Career Center website (kcc.ky.gov) or call (502) 875-0442 to file their initial claim.

What is Disaster Unemployment Assistance?

Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) is a partnering program between the USDOL and FEMA to provide funds to state UI agencies for the payment of UI benefits under certain circumstances. It provides disaster unemployment assistance to individuals who have lost employment as the result of a major disaster and are NOT otherwise eligible for regular UI benefits.

Individuals eligible for DUA benefits are those who work or live in one of the federally declared counties and lost their jobs directly due to the disaster. Those eligible may also include:

- Individuals unable to reach their job because they must travel through the affected area and are unable to do so because of the disaster.
- Individuals who were to begin employment but were prevented from doing so by the disaster.
- Individuals who became the major support for a household because of the death of the head of the household as a result of the disaster.
- Individuals who cannot work because of an injury caused as a direct result of the disaster.
- Farmers and other self-employed individuals who are traditionally ineligible for unemployment insurance (UI) benefits

DUA benefits are only payable during the Disaster Assistance Period (DAP) and shall not exceed 26 weeks. The weekly benefit amount for which the person may be eligible is determined by the governing laws in the state in which the claim was filed. Any benefits claimed under the DUA program are 100% federally funded which means employers' UI accounts will not be charged. While employer non-charging is determined by each state unemployment agency.

What is Required to File?

DUA applicants will need their Social Security number and a copy of their most recent Federal income tax forms or check stubs. Applicants are required to provide proof within 21 days of filing their DUA claim.
